

## HISTORY OF STREET NAMES

Ambrose Knight Road	Private - the road was abandoned in 1927. Ran from Sharpe Street to Route 102. Ambrose Knight was a blacksmith and lived and ran his business at the corner of Ambrose and Sharpe.
Apache Trail	When the land was subdivided in the late 1950's by Asselone and Iuliano, they gave the roads Native American names.
Arnold Farm Road	Named for the Arnold family who had a farm in the area before Route 95 came through.
Arrowhead Road	Named by the developer
Arthur Richmond Road	Private - named after the former highway supervisor. He and his son built the road for the developer.
Bailey Drive	Named for Mr. Bailey who owned land in the area.
Bailey Pond Road	Named for the Bailey family who lived on the CT side of the pond. The pond was named first and then the road was named after the pond.
Barnes Lane	Named by the developer
Barnett Lane	Originally part of Breakheart Hill Road. Named after the Barnett family who moved there in the 1960's.
Bates Trail	Bates family lived in the area.
Benjamin Reynolds Road	Named for ancestor of Hoxsie's who owned the land
Bentley Farm Road	Name was found researching deeds in the area
Big River Road	Road from Weaver Hill to Big River
Blueberry Heights	Private road formally Morton's Trailer Park
Blueridge Court	Named by developer
Brant Trail	Private - led to the old Brant homestead
Breakheart Hill Road	Ran from Route 3 to Breakheart Pond on the Exeter/WG town line. Cut off by Route 102 in the 1920's and Route 95 in the 70's.
Browns Corner Road	Named for the Brown family who lived at the corner of Route 102.
Buck Hollow Drive	Named by the developer
Burnt Saw Mill	Ran from Congdons Mill to Route 3. Sawmill & shingle mill owned by Searls Capwell & Alanson Albro. Burned down in the 1920's. Land taken for reservoir.
Cambio Court	Named after developer - Nick Cambio
Campbells Mill Trail	Old trail that led to Campbell's mill
Carr Pond	Carr family owned the pond and the road was named after the pond.
Catherine Wright Court	Named after Catherine Wright - former librarian & school committee member. Wife of Henry - former tax assessor.
Cedar Pond Way	Named by Cedar Pond Construction in the 1990's
Cedar Ridge Road	Private - Named for the trees that grow in the area
Center of New England Blvd.	Private - Named for the developemnt in Coventry & WG.
Cherokee Trail	When the land was divided in the late 1950's by Asselone and Iuliano, they gave the roads Native American names.
Cheyenne Trail	When the land was divided in the late 1950's by Asselone and Iuliano, they gave the roads Native American names.
Club House Road	Path that led to a clubhouse on the backside of Mishnock Pond in the 1930's.
Comanche Trail	When the land was divided in the late 1950's by Asselone and Iuliano, they gave the roads Native American names.
Congdon Mill Road	Named for the Congdon family who operated a grist mill by the bridge and the intersection of Burnt Saw Mill. The mill burned down.

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Crestview Road	Private - Chosen by developer
Dayna Drive	Named by developer who named it after his daughter.
Deer Run	Named by the developer
Diane Way	Private - Named after Dave Andrews' (former highway supervisor) wife.
Division Street	Runs from East Greenwich. Part of the Old Greenwich/Indian Trail. Late 1600's early 1700's when dividing off land, that road was a starting point.
Doe Place	Named by developer
Donald Davis Drive	Named for the chairman of the planning board who died unexpectedly of a massive heart attack at an early age.
Donald Potter Drive	Named by the developer
Errant Way	Named by developer - Gary Johnson
Escoheag Hill Road	The Indian translation is supposed to mean Origin of Three Rivers. The road was named after the Hill.
Falls River Road	Named after the Falls River that runs through Step Stone Falls.
Fellowship Court	Named after the developer
Finlandia Blvd.	Private - Named by John Stark who was Finish
Fish Hill Road	Straddles the Coventry and WG town line. Named for the Fish family. Icabod Fish settled there in the mid 1700's.
Fox Run	Named by developer
Francis Horne Drive	Private - located in W. Alton Jones
Fry Pond Road	Named after the Fry family Also known as Fry Mill Road & Fry School Road
Garden Matteson Lane	Private - led to Matteson farm which was cut off by Route 95
Gray Birch Road	Private - Named for the trees that grow in the area
Greenridge Court	Named by developer
Greenwich West	Private - Owned by the Beaudoins who simply reversed the Town's name
Hammitt View	Named by developer - Gary Johnson
Harry Andrews Road	The road was built in the 1970's. He was the former police chief in the 1960's & 1970's and a life long resident.
Hazard Road	Also known as Molasses Mill or Molasses Hill Road. Named after the Hazard family who lived in the area. The Molasses mill was there in the 1800's.
Heather Hollow Road	Named by developer
Henry Brown Road	Brown family (different than Seth Brown's family) settled area in the 1700's.
Henry Clay Court	Named for Henry Clay Hoxsie, former state senator & forest ranger
Hopkins Hill Road	Hopkins family settled area in 1600's. It ran from Exeter to Coventry.
Hoxsie Road	Located at the top of Nooseneck Hill on reservoir land formally owned by the Hoxsie family.
Hudson Pond Road	Named after Irving Hudson, who owned a large tract of land in that area and was owner & publisher of the Kent County Daily Times newspaper. He was involved in conservation and wild life efforts in RI.
Jennifer Lee Court	Named by the developer

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John Potter Road	John Potter a/k/a Smoker Potter was a life long resident who owned a farm located in the area. He was a state representative, senator, police chief and game warden.
Jonathan Road	Named after the developer's son
Joslin Lane	Named for ancestor of Hoxsie's who owned the land
Julie Court	Named by the developer
Kimberly Drive	Named after developer's daughter in the 1990's
King's Daughter Court	Named by developer
Kits Corner Road	Named for Christopher (Kit) Matteson House is located on the sharpe corner on Weaver Hill Rd. The road was across the street and ran from there to Big River Bridge. It was cut off by Route 95.
Knight View Drive	Named for previous owners Tom and John Knight who left land to their nephew Ermes Knight. The Knights lived in the area for over 200 years.
Lake Drive	Built in the 1960's to provide access that was cut off from Division Street when Route 95 was built.
Leyden Court	Named after the Leyden family
Liberty Hill Road	That area was called 'Liberty' during the 1800's.
Linden Lane	Named by developer
Lippit Trail	Old trail that ran from Yard Pond to Fry Pond Road.
Long View Drive	Private - ran from Mishnock to top of hill to the Breene place. Built in 1969.
Louttit Lane	Named after the Louttit family who previously owned W. Alton Jones.
Mac Cue Point	Private road sometimes confused with Lake Drive
Maguire Lane	Named after the Bob Maguire family
Marie Court	Named by the developer
Matteson Plain Road	Now abandoned. It ran from Browns Corner to Exeter. Part of the W. Alton Jones campus. The Matteson's lived in the area.
Memory Lane	Private road started in the 1930's to service summer cottages at Lake Mishnock.
Mishnock Road	Road was named after the pond and surrounding area. Was a winter Native American camp.
Mohawk Trail	When the land was divided in the late 1950's by Asselone and Iuliano, they gave the roads Native American names.
Montauk Trail	Private - Mr. Bragga was building a private summer colony at Bailey Pond during the 1950's and choose Native American names for the streets.
Muddy Brook Road	The road is named after the brook which was called the Muddy Brook because it was said to have quicksand in it. There were tales of horses and carriages sinking out of site.
Narrow Lane	Runs through Wickaboxet Management Area from Coventry to Plain Meeting House Road.
Netop Trail	Private - located in the Bailey Pond area
New Road	Abandoned - runs from Plain Road into W. Alton Jones Campus
New London Turnpike	Established in the 1850's as a stagecoach toll route between Providence and New London, CT.

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Nooseneck Hill Road	Native American word - Nooseealog ?
North and South Road	Eschoheag - Hazard - Old name changed over time. Ran from Coventry to Exeter.
Oak Ridge Road	Named by developer, Manny Leca who lived on John Potter Rd and whose family owned the land for many years.
Oak Hill Court	Named for the trees that grow in the area.
Old Hickory Road	Developed in the 1990's and named after the Old Hickory Brook which is in the vicinity.
Old Raccoon Hill Road	Named after Raccoon Hill which is the high spot in Route 102.
Orion View Drive	Named by developer
Outlook Way	Named by developer - Gary Johnson
Overview Drive	Paper Street - never developed
Packer Trail	Old path that runs from Plain Road to Hazard Road
Parker Lane	Old lane to Parker Farm in W. Alton Jones
Parkside Drive	Named because it is next to Arcadia State Park
Pequot Trail	Private - Mr. Bragga was building a private summer colony at Bailey Pond during the 1950's and choose Native American names for the streets.
Pine Grove Lane	Private - Named for the trees that grow in the area
Pine Oak Trail	Private road that led to stone house off Mac Cue Point
Pine Tree Lane	Named by developer
Plain Road	Named for the flat, cleared farm land. Runs south from Coventry to Exeter.
Plain Meeting House Road	Was the continuation of Old Greenwich Road / Indian Path that led from EG to CT. The road was named after the church (meeting house) located at the intersection. That area was called 'The Plains' in the 1700's & 1800's because it was so flat. The area around the meeting house was called WG Center even though it wasn't the center of town.
Pond View Court	Named by the developer
Poor Farm Road	Road to the old town poor farm in W. Alton Jones
Pumpkin House Road	Named after an old farm in Exeter. Runs from Route 3 besides Metcalf School into Exeter.
Raccoon Hill Road	Named after Raccoon Hill which is the high spot in Route 102.
Ragnall Road	Private - Named for Mr. Ragnall who built a private family compound bordering Mishnock and Little Mishnock. .
Regina Drive	Named by developer
Rice Trail	Old Fire trail running between Fish Hill and Weaver Hill.
Robin Hollow Road	Named after the Robin family who lived in the area
Roland Drive	Named after Roland Asslin.
Saddle Rock Road	Named by the Pratts who sold lots on the road they built across from Saddle Rock on Plain Meeting House Road

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Seminole Trail	When the land was divided in the late 1950's by Asselone and Iuliano, they gave the roads Native American names.
Seth Brown Road	The Brown family owned extensive tracts of land around the Plain Church (meeting house). Seth was the father of Charlie Brown.
Seth Way	Private - Formally Theroux Way. Named by owners.
Sharpe Street	Named for the Sharpe family who lived somewhere towards the middle of the road. Originally part of the Old Greenwich / Indian Path.
Shoop Road	Located in W. Alton Jones
Silas Wells Road	Name was found researching deeds in the area
Sprague Road	Located in W. Alton Jones
Squirrels Run	Named by the developer
Stark Drive	Private - Named by previous owner John Stark
Stratford Court	Named by the developer
Stonebridge Lane	Named by the developer
Stubble Brook Road	Named for the Stubble Brook that crosses the road
Stuckey Lane	Named after D. Stuckey, a plant professor at URI. Located in W. Alton Jones
Suzanne Court	Named after developer's wife
Sweet Saw Mill	Ran from Burnt Saw Mill to New London Turnpike. Sweet family ran the saw mill. Lane Tom was a cobbler. Lane Tom Matteson Brook.
Tanglewood Drive	Built by Harold Morton and named after the brushy tangled woods.
Technology Way	Named in 1985 for the road into the Tech Park / WelGen campus (now Amgen)
Terrace Drive	Named by the developer, Ed Overton who lived on Carrs Pond Rd.
Tiffany Lane	Named by the developer
TLC Drive	Private - named by Thayden Waltonen
Tom Tew Road	Old driftway to Tom Tew Place. Ran from Route 3 west. Cut off by 95.
Town Hall Road	Old Route 1 (Nooseneck Hill) named when 1st town hall was built in the 1930's.
Vale Court	Named by developer - Gary Johnson
Valerie Drive	Private road named for Valerie Greene whose family was forced to relocate from reservous area around 1970. Her father was Harold Greene, former building inspector.
Valley Look Court	Named by developer - Gary Johnson
Victory Highway	Named in 1927 for the US Victory of WWI. Runs from Wickford to Burrillville. First well maintained/major state road in western RI.
Voluntown Pike	Old path from Hazard Road to Voluntown CT. Main route in the 1700 & 1800's. Now goes to Pachaug State Forest in CT.
Wampanaug Trail	Private - Mr. Bragga was building a private summer colony at Bailey Pond during the 1950's and choose Native American names for the streets.
Weaver Hill Road	Named after the Weaver family. Jacob Weaver's house is still located at the corner of Sharpe and Weaver. It was also part of the Old Greenwich / Indian Path.
Welch Hollow Road	Named by the Lentzen family who lived in the area and who were of Welch decent.
West Log Bridge Road	A continuation of Log Bridge Road in Coventry that runs west into WG.
Wheatley Road	Named for George Wheatley, long time boss farmer at W. Alton Jones

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Wildfield Drive	Paper Street - never developed
Whippoorwill Way	Named by developer
Whispering Pines Terrace	Named by the developer - Bob Knox
White Brook Court	Named after the White Brook that runs in the area
Wickaboxet Drive	Named for the Wickaboxet State Park
Widow Sweets Road	Named after the old Sweet Farm. Runs from New London Turnpike at Hells Half Acre into Exeter.
William Nichols Road	He lived on the Coventry/WG line on what is now knows as West Log Bridge Road. Runs from Stubble Brook to town line.
Wills Swamp Road	Originally part of Breakheart Hill Road. Named after Will Arnold who lived in the area.
Wood River Lane	Built in the 1980's and named after the Wood River which runs through the area.
Yard Pond Road	Ran from foot of Nooseneck Hill to Yard Pond which was the water source for the mill located there. Located on reservoir land. Also known as Rag Lane.
